

Five Insights: How Infants and Toddlers Engage the World

Insight 1: Infants and toddlers experience rapid brain development

Insight 2: Infant and toddlers learn and develop in the context of important relationships.

Insight 3: Infants and toddlers are competent.

Insight 4: Infants and toddlers are vulnerable.

Insight 5: Infants and toddlers are a dynamic blend of biological predispositions and experiences.

Cognitive Development

"Cognitive Development refers to the process of growth and change in intellectual/mental abilities such as thinking, reasoning, and understanding. It includes the acquisition and consolidation of knowledge."

California Infant/Toddler Learning & Development Foundations: Cognitive Domain

Number Sense

"Number sense refers to children's concepts of numbers and the relationships among number concepts".

"You have two eyes like your bear."

"How many are there? Let's count. 1, 2...."

"You have more crackers than me"

"That's the third time you threw the ball to me."







Classification

"The developing ability to group, sort, categorize, connect, and have expectations of objects and people according to their attributes."

California Infant/Toddler Learning & Development Foundations, pg. 62

Hesitant to be feed a bottle from a new caregiver (8 months)

Bangs two different toys on the ground (8 months)

Pretends to pour from a pitcher into the cup (18 months)

Puts all the ball in one basket



Classification highlights: 8 - 18 Months

Distinguish between familiar and unfamiliar people, places and objects, and explore the differences between them

Shows awareness that objects are connected (18 months)

Matches 2 objects that are the same



Classification highlights: 36 Months

- Group objects into multiple piles based on one attribute at a time
- Similar but not the same in a group





Active participation during routines build an early foundation for math





Infants and toddlers build an early foundation for math during self-initiated play





Guiding Principles

- Relate to the child as an active meaning maker
- Provide opportunities for exploration
- Respect the child's initiative and choices
- Allow ample time for children to make sense of experiences
- Appreciate the child's creativity
- Describe the child's actions and the effects of actions
- Support self-initiated repetition and practice
- Give appropriate encouragement for problem solving and mastery
