Five Little Pumpkins

Can you roll into fun with the pumpkins?

Topics: counting, ordinal numbers

Math Connections: Use *Five Little Pumpkins* to introduce *ordinal numbers*. These are the numbers that tell the position of something in a list: first, second, third, and so on. Little ones can also practice counting to five on each page.

As you read this book to infants and toddlers, point out the five pumpkins and talk about the colors on the page: "The pumpkins are orange, the ghost is white, the witch is green... etc." Count the pumpkins together aloud. For infants, guide your baby's finger to each pumpkin. For older children, encourage them to point to each pumpkin as you count together.

Counting and giving each object one number name is called *one-to-one correspondence*. One-to-one correspondence is the basis for counting a group of objects. When you finish counting the pumpkins, announce that there are five pumpkins! This is called *cardinality*. Cardinality is knowing that the last number said when counting is the total number of objects. Both of these concepts take some time for children to learn. Model these skills as you count in everyday life.

Find other contexts in which you can use ordinal numbers. Perhaps it is the bedtime routine: "First we eat dinner, second we have a bath, and third we go to bed." Or maybe the child's toys are lined up: "First is Lion, second is the blue car, third is the dinosaur, and fourth is the yellow truck."

Extension Questions:

1. What do you notice on *this* page? Which pumpkin is frowning?
2. How many pumpkins are there? Let's count!
3. How many witches are in the air?
4. What do you notice about each of the pumpkins' faces?
